



Lent is beginning to wrap up. I hope you found some inspiring formation opportunities. Besides the Day of Recollection, I did find some good reading and prayer time as well. Here are a couple I'd recommend.

I Can Fix This (2024), by Kristina Kuzmic, was quite eye-opening for this priest. Here is a mother of an adolescent battling major depression – and dealing with her own feelings of inadequacy and

ignorance and lies. A couple chapters are titled: "I am in Control" and "Progress is a Straight Line." Her son, Luka, is dealing with addiction as well as mental health collapse, and consumes so much of her energy and life, but she learns how to balance in order to survive these mammoth issues. She is tenacious, as we are all called to be in order to survive the hurricanes that invade our lives. Some stories are quite startling. The Afterword is composed by Luka, who has definitely turned a corner and is full of hope.

Can one still mine the horrors of World War II for more inspiration? I was surprised that I could with *The Tattooist of Auschwitz* (2018) by Heather Morris. This engrossing story is based on the real-life story of Ludwig (Lale) Sokolov, a Jew from Slovakia, who tattooed the arms of prisoners brought into these camps from 1942-1945. The story is made more compelling by his falling in love with Gita Fuhrman and that somehow, they survived, although both struggled with the ongoing torture and killing of their compatriots while imprisoned. She worked in the administrative building, so neither was as vulnerable to extermination as their fellow prisoners. Apparently, this book was made into a mini-series and a movie.

If I were to pick a best book I've read last year, it would be *Incarnating Grace* (2024) by Julia Feder. This professor has rekindled some hope in me which all the badness around us seems to erode away. She addresses a better theological approach to the evils of sexual abuse. God continues to accompany us through the very worst of times. Jesus on the cross abandoned himself totally to the Father, despite the apparent waste and annihilation he surely felt he was to experience and he was not let down. Nor will we be. In story after story of horrific experiences, the author sees her own hope strengthened. But it is not an easy book to read – delving into the details of St Teresa of Avila's and Rev. Edward Schillebeeckx's thoughts.

Lastly, I'm currently finishing up *Following the Call* (2021), a wonderful collection of short essays from a wide variety of voices on how to really appreciate and live the words Jesus spoke in Matthew chapters 5, 6, and 7 – the Sermon on the Mount. Charles Moore is the editor of this Plough publication. The authors range from St Clement of Alexandria and St John Chrysostom to present-day folks like Barbara Brown Taylor and N.T. Wright. What a breadth of experience and such faithfulness to Jesus! This book makes us look much deeper into words that have become too familiar to us – and re-ignites their power.

Child Abuse Prevention Month- Reporting Child Abuse:

It is every adult's moral responsibility to report known or suspected abuse or neglect of a minor to the responsible authorities. Physical and sexual abuse of minors are pervasive societal problems, and only concerted and sustained efforts by all adults in every segment of society can help to protect children and youth. In the 2023 Pennsylvania statewide report there were 5,129 substantiated reports of child abuse. 1,749 or 34.1% of the substantiated reports were for sexual abuse, 1,350 were physical abuse. Parents remain the persons most responsible for abuse of their children. To report child abuse, call Childline at 1-800-932-0313 (anytime 24/7). 

BULLETIN INFORMATION MUST BE RECEIVED IN WRITING BY NOON ON FRIDAY 2 WEEKS PRIOR TO BULLETIN DATE.

MEMBERSHIP: All Baptized Catholics should be registered, practicing and supporting members of a Parish. Only properly registered members appear on our parish list and are eligible to receive the benefits of parish membership for sacraments. Each parishioner is called upon to practice good stewardship of time, talent and treasure. If you are not currently receiving envelopes, you may not be registered. Call the Parish Office - we would love to meet you!

MARRIAGE: Couples need to contact a priest *at least six months before their wedding*. Registered and active participation needs to be considered before marriage.

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS:

We welcome all inquiries about the Catholic faith. This **RCIA** process begins in the fall of the year. Please call the Parish Office for further information.

PASTORAL CARE OF THE SICK: Please call the Parish Office to request the Sacrament of the Sick for family members who are seriously ill. Communion for the sick is taken to the hospital, nursing homes, and the homebound on a regular basis.

BAPTISM: Both parents must attend the Pre-Baptism Preparation Program. Please call the St. Bernard Parish Office for dates and times of upcoming class. Baptisms are scheduled after completing the program. Call the Parish Office to schedule the class and baptism. Godparents must be at least 16, confirmed and active, registered members of their parish.
