

Jesus said to Simon, "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching men." When they brought their boats to the shore, they left everything and followed him. - Lk 5:10-11 In this month's *America* magazine, the cover story is entitled, "Why Sunday matters: Youth sports, Mass, and the meaning of rest." Fr. Jim contacted me the day after I devoured the article and we've already talked about it at the parish office. Since when have sports become more important than religion in our world?

A WORD FROM THE PASTOR The article is written by a father who is now a Father. He raised a Catholic-sized family as an Episcopalian and is now a Roman Catholic priest in the Diocese of Dallas – so he's seen this issue from multiple sides. Fr. Joshua Whitfield says, "The Romans went about it all wrong. If they wanted to wipe Christians off the face of the earth, they didn't need to arrest them or try them, persecute or kill them... Perhaps if the ancients weren't so bloodthirsty, they would have understood better the power of distraction over destruction. Would early Christianity have survived the cultural allure and power of today's youth sports? I'm not so sure." (pp. 21-22)

He says the fight is for the humanity and souls of our children – "What's at stake isn't just a game." Which is part of the problem – when did sports stop being just fun? I also come from that ancient Boomer generation when we had "pick up" games of baseball, basketball, and football, not to mention volleyball (my personal favorite). They were just fun. But organized sports can begin to take the fun out of it.


Proverbs 8:30 says about creation, wisdom, and God: "Then I was beside him as his craftsman, and I was his delight by day, playing before him all the while." And in liturgy (Mass, sacraments), we enter into play - which is why Church insists that Sunday Mass is to be part of every family's life (and each person's life). Liturgy is play and pulls us all into rest – something we essentially need.

"Perhaps [we] could make room for casual gatherings on occasional Sunday afternoons for no other purpose than to play, talk, laugh: to offer space for friends and families to do nothing other than while away the time [together]." We can do something to tweak our sports programs to make them healthier – even spiritually. Will we? Fr John




Dear Jesus,

The gift of the Mission

Early on in my work in parish ministry, I had to deal with a tough human resources situation, letting some staff members go and stepping into a role that demanded more of my time and energy.

In moments like this, stewardship can feel burdensome. Things take a turn we didn't expect, perhaps in spite of our best efforts. Maybe more is asked of us than we want or feel prepared to give.


But that's when we need to remember that stewardship isn't a job that we apply for. It's a gift bestowed directly from God, the Creator of all, and that can be scary all on its own, if we are preoccupied with our own unworthiness. What we might want to do is fall on our knees like Simon Peter and announce, "Depart from me, Lord — I am sinful."

But what if we stop looking in the mirror and look instead to God?

All those years ago, when I was faced with that ministerial challenge, I asked my wife to join me. What started as a tough situation turned into a decade of shared ministry with her — an experience I wouldn't trade for anything. It was a burden that became a gift.

We must remember that God knows what He is about. In His mercy, He gives us what we need as everyday stewards. When God calls out, "Whom shall we send?" we — in all our sinfulness — are allowed to cry out "Send me, Lord!" And He sends us out and behold — our nets tear with the bounty we harvest in His name. — Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS

The Catch—I love today's Gospel passage, and not just because I love a good fish fry. I love it because I am Peter. Over and over again, I am Peter, standing here exhausted because I relied on my own abilities, and it got me nowhere. I'm ready to call it guits. I'm ready to say it's too hard. And here comes Jesus, asking me to lower my net. To keep trying. And I try to talk sense into him. "It's not going to work, God," I insist. " "You've been trying," Jesus agrees. "But you haven't asked for my help yet." What does it mean to lower your net? It sounds so simple and so easy, but it takes a great deal of humility and trust. I think I'm the expert on my own life, the captain of my own ship. Peter probably thought so, too — he was the fisherman, after all. Why would a fisherman listen to a carpenter on matters of fishing? Lowering your net means giving God control and letting yourself be changed by what He chooses to show you. It means to listen to God's instructions, even when you don't understand them, even when you find them frustrating. It means to keep trying the hard thing that you know is the right thing, even when it hasn't born much fruit. It means to keep loving the person who is making life hard on you, even when all you want to do is give into feelings of bitterness and distrust. If we would only lower our nets, the catch would astound us. **©LPi**



MEMBERSHIP: All Baptized Catholics should be registered, practicing and supporting members of a Parish. Only properly registered members appear on our parish list and are eligible to receive the benefits of parish membership for sacraments. Each parishioner is called upon to practice good stewardship of time, talent and treasure. If you are not currently receiving envelopes, you may not be registered. Call the Parish Office - we would love to meet you!

MARRIAGE: Couples need to contact a priest *at least six months before their wedding*. Registered and active participation needs to be considered before marriage.

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS:

We welcome all inquiries about the Catholic faith. This **RCIA** process begins in the fall of the year. Please call the Parish Office for further information.

PASTORAL CARE OF THE SICK: Please call the Parish Office to request the Sacrament of the Sick for family members who are seriously ill. Communion for the sick is taken to the hospital, nursing homes, and the homebound on a regular basis.
